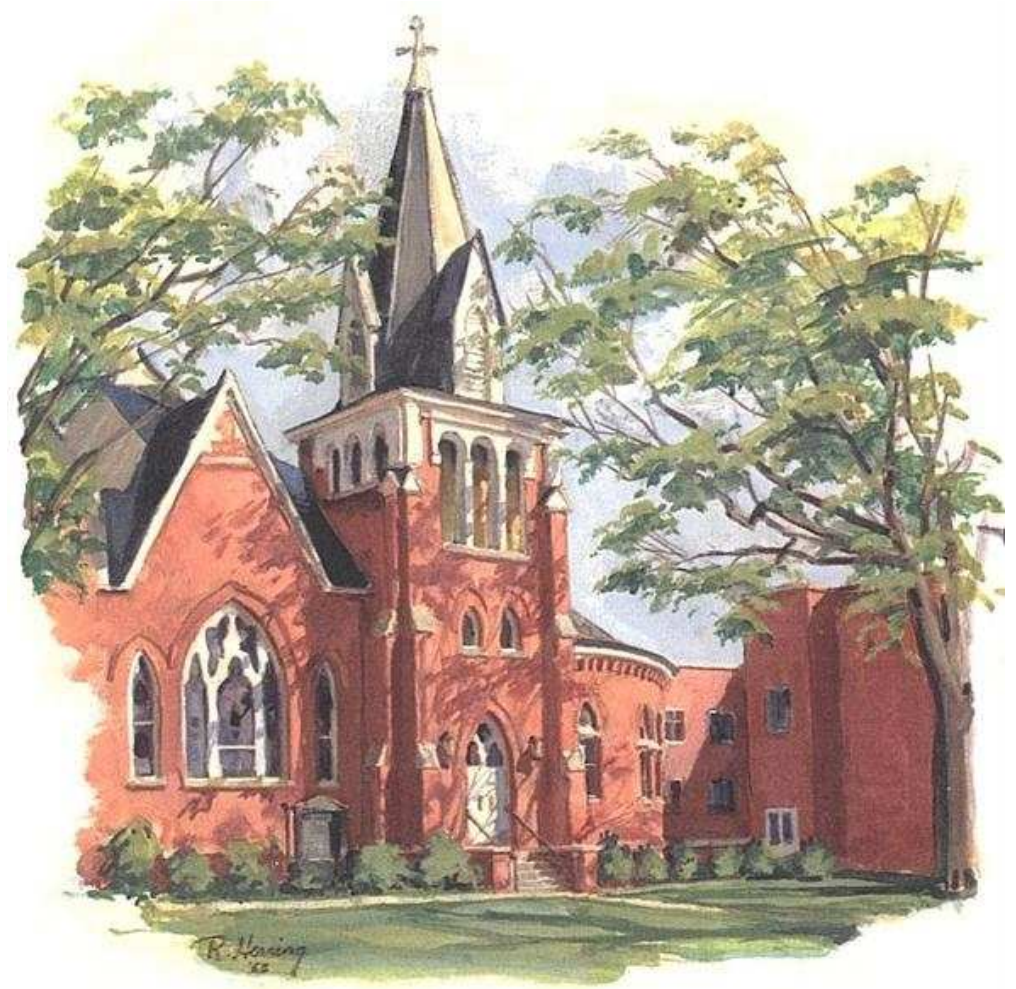

Symbolism of the Advent Wreath: A longstanding custom at First Presbyterian Church is the weekly lighting of candles in an Advent wreath during worship services. In addition to adding to the spirit of the season, there is also much symbolism in the wreath that you may not recognize.

- The wreath is in the form of a circle, a traditional Christian symbol for God. As a circle has no beginning and no end, it represents the One is eternal and without beginning or end.
- The Advent wreath is made from evergreens. These branches are “ever alive,” and thus symbolic of Christ, who died but who is risen and alive today and forevermore.
- Entwined around the circle of evergreens are red holly berries, resembling drops of blood. These represent the blood shed by Christ for humanity, reminding us that Christ came into this world to die for us and to redeem us.
- The wreath has around it four candles, corresponding to the four weeks of the Advent season. Each candle represents a core characteristic of the gospel—hope (week 1), peace (week 2), joy (week 3), and love (week 4). In the wreath’s center is the Christ candle, symbolizing Jesus as the Light of the World and the central focus of God’s redemptive plan.
