A Mission Update... the work continues

Our church has a long history of involvement with the hospital in Mwandi, Zambia. We have:

- helped to bring electricity to the mission hospital and the surrounding village,
- provided a satellite telephone for emergency communications,
- provided notebook computers and training for the hospital staff and mission personnel,
- provided the infrastructure for Internet serve via satellite and wireless networking,
- sent medical teams to work in the hospital,
- provided direct assistance for the Orphans and Vulnerable Children's (OVC) program,
- established a library with over 900 books at the OVC center,
- provided ongoing financial support for the resident missionaries (currently, Ida and Keith Waddell),
- provided scholarships for 29 children to attend

boarding school in Sesheke (there is no local high school) and 10 students to attend night school (in Mwandi).

The next Mooresville delegation, comprised of members from FPC and Lake Norman Fellowship, will be going to Mwandi in June (tentatively June 14-28). The plans are to continue the Communications Project (replacing old and worn-out computers, adding additional networking infrastructure, securing the network and general maintenance), to work in the OVC Center (adding to the Library and working with the children) and to do a video documentary of the work going on at the Mwandi Hospital Mission. Your continued prayers for these latest projects ...as well as for the hospital, its patients, staff, volunteers and the larger community of Mwandi are invited and encouraged.

A Word From The Pastor



The title I hold here is "interim" pastor. I looked that word up in the on-line Merriam-Webster for "interim" as an adjective and got: "*done, made, appointed, or occurring for an interim.*" I checked further and discovered that "interim" as a noun means "*interval*" or "*an intervening time.*" It occurred to me that we're all "interims." Most of us don't think much about life on earth as an interim experience, but the Bible does. Psalm 39:12 has this comforting thought, "*Hear my prayer, O Lord...for I am thy passing guest.*" We are God's guests here. We are *interim* residents of planet Earth. This would suggest that as good guests we should treat the world with respect, its inhabitants as fellow invitees, its resources as provisions for our comfort supplied by our Host. What we call "ours," therefore we cannot possess but only borrow. And though we may like some of our fellow guests more than others, all deserve our respect for all have been invited by the same Host.

Another helpful text is Romans 14:7-8, one that I found immensely comforting at a critical moment in my life: "*None of us lives to himself, and none of us dies to himself. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's.*" It seems to me that the only person who could "live to himself (or herself)" would be one who did not realize the interim-ness of their earthly existence.

A third helpful thought is that Jesus himself knew he was an "interim." The beloved verses of John 14, where Jesus tries to comfort his disciples before his death, are evidence of Jesus' understanding that his earthly life would be transitory. "*Let not your hearts be troubled; believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms. I go to prepare a place for you...that where I am, you may be also.*" Our time here, then, is part of a continuum, an interval in an everlasting life available to any and all who dare to trust the words of Jesus and will say 'yes' to God's gracious invitation. If Jesus himself understood the interim nature of human existence, why should we as his followers cling so tenaciously to wealth and privilege and prestige, which clearly are transitory and at best illusory?

My "interim" pastor time will eventually run out. Soon (Hallelujah!) you will have a new pastor, not an interim but one who will be called and installed. But my interim life on earth will continue, as will yours and that of all God's people. The more we realize that we are in truth God's "passing guests," the more gracious and thoughtful and genuine our earthly lives will be.

Saints to visit Charlotte Museum of History

The Saints Alive group is planning a trip to the Charlotte Museum of History and the Hezekiah Alexander Homesite on Tuesday, February 7. The group plans to leave at 11:00 a.m., eat lunch on the way to Charlotte, tour the museum and homesite at 1:00 p.m., and return to Mooresville around 3:30/4:00 p.m. Admission cost is \$4.

The museum features history related to the Charlotte area and details historical events and artifacts in various galleries, including separate galleries for the 18th, 19th and 20th centuries. The group will also have the opportunity to see a temporary exhibit, “American Visions of Liberty & Freedom,” organized by the Virginia Historical Society. This exhibit shows a wide variety of symbols that have been used to represent the concept of liberty and freedom throughout American history.



Also included in the museum tour is a tour of the Hezekiah Alexander Historic Homesite, located adjacent to the museum. Built in 1774, it is the oldest surviving structure in Mecklenburg County and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The interior of the house has been furnished with decorative arts from the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries.

Music Notes by Alan Sledge

The Greatest Church Musician?

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's response to the idea of making church music was a little like the average child's reaction to being told to eat his spinach.



On January 27th, 2006, the world marked the 250th anniversary of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's birth.

And much fuss has been made over just how much Mozart hated having to write mostly church music during his time in Salzburg.

But as the teenage organist for the Salzburg Cathedral, the prodigy had a whole cast of great musicians around him. He wrote a set of mini-concertos for organ and orchestra, including one of the later church sonatas, the Sonata in C, K. 329.

While employed in Salzburg, Mozart wrote a dozen masses. And even after he escaped to Vienna — and was free to write whatever he wanted — he began work on another religious work — the great C Minor Mass, with its stunning Kyrie. And the Coronation Mass lends a glimpse of Mozart's operatic aspirations.

Still later came other great sacred works, including the Dominican Vespers, K. 321; the Exultate, Jubilate of 1773; and the Ave Verum Corpus.

Last Sunday, January 29, our own Middle School Handbell choir rang an arrangement of the Mozart works *Ave Verum Corpus*, in recognition of this great church composer.

You will also see the marvelous way in which God was able to preserve and promote Joseph throughout his numerous ordeals on his journey from the pit to the palace. Eventually, Joseph extends forgiveness and acceptance to his siblings, though they caused him to suffer severely.

The Logos choir's first production will be at the March church-night supper on Sunday, March 5, 2006. The choir will then take the musical on the road for the 2006 spring trip on Saturday and Sunday, March 18 & 19.
